As a step towards the Central Government's initiative of digitalizing India, the college has gone a step further in adopting electronic medium of communication in all its formal procedures. The system of online payment of fees, online application procedure for admission to various courses, adoption of electronic means to communicate the selected candidates, were adopted during the current academic year. A new roadmap has been laid by the COE'S office and there had been online declaration of end of semester results.



Digitalization had also been imparted in the functioning of library. The college has introduced biometric attendance from the academic year 2015-16. A new digital board has been installed for communicating the daily events to the stakeholders of the institution. Thus, paper less environment contributes to greening the transactions. All CCTV cameras functioning at the college is connected to the office of the Principal, the vice Principal and the Bursar to trace miscreants on the campus thus offering security to the habitants of the college.

E STOREHOUSING

N List

The college provides access to e books and e journals through the N list of UGC. The DPM library provides the facility of accessibility to the faculty and student community. Book lovers throng the library every other day from 8 AM to 8 PM. N list is accessible at library from 10 AM onwards each day of the week. The faculty are provided with a username and password to access the N List any time of the day. The college has been rated among the top institutions of the country for its participation in the N LIST accessibility for the past five consecutive years.

The lush full greenery is guarded, renewed by the college administration from time to time. The college has special interest in promoting environmental consciousness to all its stakeholders. Consequently, the college has a green club which conducts programmes and commemorates special days of the seasons namely, environment day, ozone day, sparrow day wild life day and so on. Students are encouraged to participate in special events of the club activities through essay writing and sketching competitions, photography and participation in rallies.

Mushroom, beehives, butterfly cultivation and botanical garden are promoted within the college premises. The rich flora and fauna are explored and new species are identified. Stock taking of the flora and fauna of the college are carried on at regular intervals. Aero water plants are installed and are under operation. Solid waste management is also carried out by which the college promotes and cherishes its commitment to ensuring greening the campus and maintaining the same.



The campus is litter free and use of polythene bags are prohibited on campus. To ensure dust free environment, the roads are paved with concrete blocks which allow the rain water to penetrate. The following protocols are adopted by the administration towards green audit.

BIOLOGICAL PRUDENCE

• Sustainable development

The campus is smoke free and noise free. Vehicles are parked at the parking lots and driving in is discouraged on campus. Honking horns is prohibited. Movement on foot by members are encouraged. Harnessing of solar energy by installing solar panels, optimum use of electricity through use of CFL Bulbs, use of POT type regulators for fans, ventilated classrooms with high ceiling facilities, use of energy star devices are taken as measures to sustainable development. Cultural programmes are conducted at open air auditorium- am phi theatre as a step towards energy conservation.

Bio Diversity

The campus has enamored flora and fauna – ranging from reptiles to amphibians, Pisces and mammalians. The rich flora of the campus has good aged trees, which are both of Indian as well as foreign origin, surviving in the tropical Madurai. New species of insects and other reptiles, maintain the food chain balance thus resulting in a healthy ecological habitation on the campus. Every year the college is the preferred destination to the migrating birds.

It is noteworthy that the college run student Xerox centre and the DPM library assistants constitute members of the student community. Self-help is the best help is livened through these centres.

BRIDGE 2Lunch Assistance Programme

The voluntary contributions from the faculty fund this programme. Deserving students are identified after careful scrutiny of applications received and are provided with free lunch at the college hostel.
