- More collaboration with reputed Universities and Industries may be taken up to improve the industry Academia linkage through internships and on-job training.
- College may identify a few thrust areas for providing interdisciplinary research and establishing itself as a Centre of Excellence.
- The College may plan for a central Instrumentation Room for all Science Departments
- The college may come up with an HR Policy that will provide attractive incentives and performance based perks to talented faculty with a view to attract and retain them for the various self financed programs.
- Autonomy setup and Evaluation pattern needs to be reviewed as per UGC norms.
