15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The College offers Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary undergraduate programmes in departments like Religion,Philosophy&Sociology, Biochemistry and Commerce with Computer Applications. In addition to that, all the studenta are given interdisciplinary exposure throgh supportive courses, life skill courses and nonmajor elective courses. In postgraduate courses, emphasis is given on interdisciplinary projects.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

In 2020-2021, students were encouraged to opt for massive open online courses, offered in SWAYAM platform. It was decided to introduce a list of (MOOC) for approval in the BOS from the next academic year onwards.

17.Skill development:

All departments offer skill-based courses to improve the skill development among students. Apart from offering skill based courses from the academic expertise of the college, separate memorandum of understanding (MoU) have been signed with national and international organizations like, Central food technological research institution, Chellamuthu trust, Arthur Asirvatham Hospital, Youth development Yi Madurai chapter, Logistic Sector Skill Council(National Skill Development Corporation of Indian), Ureka Education Group, Oxford UK, (for employability enhancing skills), Yuva Active Advocacy forum to promote skill development.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The College offers undergraduate and post graduate programmes in Indian languages, Tamil and Hindi. Moreover, all the students are taught in Tamil or Hindi for atleast two to four semesters, as Part-I language. The Departments of Tamil, English, Economics, Hindi, Religion, Philosophy, and Sociology offer courses to integrate the culture and Indian knowledge system into their respective fields of study. All final year students are taught a course in value education, in which the need to uphold social and cultural values of Indian society is highlighted. There is a study centre for Indian literature in English and Translation which houses 10,000 volumes of literature translated into English from Indian Language for the use

of students.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

To update the process of curriculum designing, Teaching-Learning and Evaluation, the College has adopted Outcome Based Education. In order to implement Bloom's Taxonomy in curriculum designing, teaching methodology and setting question paper, IQAC organized a workshop on Outcome Based Education for the Faculty. Based on the current demands, the Programme Outcomes (PO) and Programme Specific Outcome (PSO) were designed and courses were framed in such a way to adopt the PO and PSO of the specific programme. The curriculum is updated periodically to meet the needs of students in placement, clearing competitive examinations and higher studies. The OBE teaching Pedagogy has seen a paradigm shift from a teacher centric to a student centric teaching learning process.

20.Distance education/online education:

Value Added Courses were offered by each department apart from the curriculum through online mode, to provide additional learner-centric, graded-skill-oriented training, and promoting the employability skills of students. These Value-Added courses prepare students to meet industry demands and bridge the skill-gaps between the academia and industry. The college took a policy decision that every department should offer at least one Value-Added course per semester to its students. Department-wise Value-Added courses are offered to students irrespective of stream of study. Both Continuous Internal Assessment and End-of-Semester Examinations are conducted only ONLINE.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

The Institution ensures periodic curriculum revision and effective curriculum delivery by following the academic calendar provided by the college. The curricular framework is designed based on the Outcome Based Education reflecting the institution's vision and mission. To meet the needs of a complex global society, new programmes were introduced by the institution. The courses focus on National integration, culture, heritage, gender, environmental

and other social issues. They also inculcate scientific temper and professional edge to the students enhancing the scope for employability.

Courses on skill based and personality development prepare the students for employment. The newly introduced postgraduate programme on Data Science, Visual Communication, Psychology exposes students to dynamic horizons.

The Language courses English and French impart communication skills in global languages. Mandatory computer and soft skills training equip the students with employability acumen. Courses on Economy, Philosophy, Social Work, Commerce, Data Science, Psychology, Biotechnology, Bioinformatics and Microbiology are in great demand at the International level for both higher education and employability.

Extension activities such as NCC Air wing, Naval wing were introduced in addition to the already existing NCC, NSS SLP programmes to promote national awareness towards the country's defence forces and be a responsible citizen. The curricula of all the programmes were augmented with the support of Value added courses. The extension activity serves the local community through the various camps in villages and literacy programmes in schools.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

Professional ethics

The knowledge of professional ethics helps to work with commitment, dedication, sincerity, honesty and with integrity ultimately building up a strong nation. In this regard, courses like business ethics and corporate governance, environment and ethical issues introduction to ethics has been incorporated in the curriculum.

Gender

The college has created a separate wing called Centre for Women Studies to sensitize the students on the role and importance of women at home, at work place and in nation building. Apart from this, the Department of Economics has included Gender Economics as one of the core paper in the curriculum. Many departments have introduced various courses on gender issues such as Gender in Indian History, Philosophy of Gender studies, Human Rights, Gender in Society and Women's writing as part of curriculum.

Human values

Recognizing the importance of values, the College has introduced value education and ethical studies - a compulsory course as early as in the year 1978 by the pioneering department Religion, Philosophy and Sociology exclusively for aided stream and Human Value Development Program for Self Finance stream.

Environment and Sustainability

Environment studies is a multi-disciplinary subject concerning the complex interactions between development and environment. To prevent further deterioration of the environment and restore its stability requires concerted multi-pronged effort by all stake holders in the society. As one of the stakeholders, the college on its part has introduced a mandatory course across all the department on environmental studies to create awareness about the environment and sustainable development.

Every department has an LCD projector, which helps the teachers to handle classes, special lectures, and student seminars. Classrooms with Smartboards are luxury for teachers while handling touch concepts and students give their seminar presentations more confidently in Smart classrooms than in regular classrooms. Other ICT tools such as headphones, digital cameras, web cameras, audio-video recording equipment, and software also come in handy for teachers to train students in speaking and listening skills, making short films, advertisements, and skits. Language Lab in college is a divine gift for language students. E-calendars, task managers are handy in scheduling tests, exams, assignments, and quizzes

ICT tools helped the teachers and students in fulfilling the academic activity during the pandemic without suspending classes. College Library is RFID enabled saving time for students and other users. Library also provides Plagiarism checking software (Urkund) for helping teachers, students in their research publications, and this feature is also extended to the public.

2.5.3 - IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes including Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) have brought in considerable improvement in the Examination Management System (EMS) of the Institution

The mode of assessment of the performance of students in the Under Graduate, Post Graduate and MPhil Programmes shall be both on the basis of Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End-of-Semester Examination (EOS) with equal weightage of 50% each. In case of CIA, two centralised tests and quizzes will be conducted at specified timings. Third test-cum-quiz will be given by registration to those who are absent in the first or second tests or both, and those who would like to improve their scores. To appear in the End-

Examination process has been made online including enrolment, fee-payment and issuance of hall-tickets with QR Code. Computerised valuation is being made by the introduction of MCQs in Section A which are done in OMR sheet. The Exam Schedule for both CIA and EOS is published online by the office of the Controller of Examinations.

The Course Teachers shall value the answer scripts after the conduct of each test / assignment / quiz under the CIA within a week and return the scripts / papers to the students after making online entries. Due to pandemic, the examinations were conducted online based on the communications received from the Government of Tamilnadu.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The American College renders service in two campuses, Main campus spanning forty-eight acres at the heart of the city and a Satellite campus spanning fifty-four acres, at Chattrapatti.

The main campus houses Research centers, Community college programs and three Autonomous bodies (Study Center for Indian Literature in English and Translation, Department of Applied Science, American College Central Instrumentation Center).

There are (fourteen, three) academic blocks respectively in these campuses. Each block is provided with space for administration (HOD, teaching and non-teaching), drinking water facility, fire extinguishers, wheelchair ramps and notice boards.

All 149 classrooms are Wi-Fi connected. The smart classrooms have LCD or Smart boards. Conference halls are provided with uninterrupted power supply. All class rooms are well-lit, ventilated with good acoustics and black/green/white boards.

The department laboratories operate with facilities ranging from basic tools to advanced research equipment. The central instrumentation center, housing sophisticated analytical techniques in physical and biological sciences, provides services to internal and external members. Two video centers with advanced equipments provide state-of-the-art facilities.

The main library, Daniel Poor Memorial Library is a store house for rare, historical and latest books. The department libraries

cater the needs of the departments in unison with the main library. The SCILET receives international attention in promoting Indian literature in English and translation. The two campuses are network-connected with Wi-Fi speed of 260 Mbps. Browsing facilities are provided to students. The language lab serves to develop the communicative skills. A computer center serves the physically challenged students to gain computer knowledge.

Daniel Poor Memorial Library is the only fully Automated library in south Tamilnadu with KOHA software and Egate system. Library has installed CDS/ISIS Software Version 3.08 during 1997 developed by UNESCO. This software provides services of cataloguing OPAC, Integrated Library Management Software.

Though our library has advanced systems than many other academic libraries in Tamil Nadu, we have further plans to enhance the library from fully automated library to a Digital Library. As the concept of DIGITAL LIBRARY gains momentum during this third decade of the 21st Century around the Globe, the Daniel Poor Memorial Library also would be on INTERNATIONAL STANDARD with the completion of these plans in near future. The following is our Plan of action.

1. To realize the dream of becoming a DIGITAL LIBRARY, we have already started a 'DIGITIZATION' Project of rare books in the library in collaboration with Anna Centenary Library Chennai. This Project has identified Hundreds of Rare collections from our stack for our project. This is the first step in the process of complete DIGITIZATION of our Library.

2. We have completed DIGITIZATION of 1440 Rare books under UNITED BOARD (UB) project already and the digitized copies of the rare books are available in the library for the benefit of our students.

3. We plan to connect all the Department Libraries with The DPM Library in order to serve the student community and academicians in a better way.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 - Institution has an IT policy covering Wi-Fi, cyber security, etc. and has allocated budget for updating its IT facilities

The American College has allocated around Rs. One hundred and fifty lakhs towards IT infrastructure development and maintenance for the academic year 2021-2022. It has provided an internet connectivity of 200 Mbps in the Main campus and 60 Mbps in the Satellite campus.

The Internet Service Provider (ISP) is located in the Datacenter from where internet bandwidth is distributed to all buildings that are connected with optical fibre cable (OFC) and alternative redundancy copper cables. There are more than 47 wifi access points. The connection from the WiFi is monitored and filtered using Fortinet Fortigate 600E USA firewall for students' access.

The policies in the firewall is implemented on the following categories

- Admin Users - Has no restriction. (for College Officials and network administrators)
- Faculty Users - Has no restriction. (for Faculties and Other staffs)
- Wifi Users - Restriction is given in such a way that Students can only access educational contents and other websites related to education

Special policies are implemented for computer in Controller of examination's office for high priority access to college's website. The college officials have individual network provided by the ISP to prevent data privacy. Office computers are secured by Kaspersky Antivirus.

There are free internet cafes provided in DPM Library for students, faculties and research scholars. Seven hundred and ninety two computers are provided for students and one hundred and twenty three for office use. Webpage mark entry software is initiated with help of the students of computer science department.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities – classrooms, laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, etc.

Annual budgeting for the college is done at various stages. Expenditure towards buildings, repairs, supplies, apparatus, books etc., under the approved budget is done. Maintenance of campus security, canteen, rest rooms and common areas are outsourced. Laboratories are equipped with fire management systems, first-aid kits, fume cupboards and exhausts. Lab equipments and stock registers are maintained by lab assistants.

The Daniel Poor Memorial Library is open to all users from 8am to 8pm. Library staff looks after the maintenance of the resources, furniture, electronic equipment, computers and software. Library is strictly monitored by library staff, RFID integrated security gate and CCTV camera. Plagiarism-consultancy centre maintaining based on standard operating procedure. IRINS metrics is updated by the librarian.

Sports equipment are periodically maintained. Maintenance of various play fields and indoor stadium are done regularly. Gymnasias, play fields and courts are fully utilized.

Cleaning is done by non-teaching staff. Furniture, writing boards, are periodically renewed. On an average sixty five percent of annual budget is spent for class room maintenance.

CCTV is installed in the campus. Twenty eight bore wells , five RO Plants and water tanks are available for clean drinking water facilities and are regularly serviced. Rain Water harvesting is implemented. Campus is maintained plastic-free. A solid waste management unit (Vermi Compost) is newly developed. A cooperative store operates on the main campus.

All buildings are provided with wheel chair ramps and connected

with generators. 3 Solar plants are used for generating 20,000 units of electricity per month.

The American college fulfils its social commitment of wastes disposal. College has the practice of minimising waste in every aspect. For solid organic wastes, a gathering and treatment system

has been implemented. This kind of wastes generated in the gardens, messes, canteen, student lounges and coffee points. The College Composting Plant allows transforming its own organic wastes into a nutrient rich substrate (humus) used for green areas maintenance. The composting plant generates 150 m³/year of compost, which allows covering the needs of substrate for the green areas of the campus and an excess for commercialization.

Plastic and other nondegradable waste are gathered and separated manually and then the unusable wastes are disposed through municipal corporation. Approximately 3 tons/year of plastic have been transferred to corporation. Broken materials from furniture, laboratories and other places are dispersed as scrap.

Burnout inverter batteries and other worn-out electrical spares are also disposed as scrap. During the pandemic, e-wastes like computer spares and accessories are being kept at the lab itself for practical purpose.

Liquid waste from the Microbiology lab is drained into the carbon soak pit. The waste water from the Main RO plant has been used at hostel washrooms and in gardening.
