15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The College offers Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary undergraduate programmes in departments like Religion, Philosophy & Sociology, Biochemistry and Commerce with Computer Applications. In addition to that, all the students are given interdisciplinary exposure through supportive courses, life skill courses and non-major elective courses. Interdisciplinary projects are prioritized in postgraduate courses especially the department like Zoology, Botany and Chemistry togetherly provide an interdisciplinary project to the students. The students were encouraged to opt for massive open online courses, offered in SWAYAM platform.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The American College adopts and encourages choice-based credit system for the benefit of the students. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week. The semester system accelerates the teaching learning process and enables vertical and horizontal mobility in learning. Also, we enable own pace learning, undergo additional courses and acquire more than the requested credits. An Interdisciplinary approach to learning employment-oriented courses through Value Added Courses. In addition, the American College strongly encourages and equips these students to get special credit for MOOC and Swayam course. The American College has established collaborations and partnership to encourage alliances with universities, organizations, and educational institutions abroad. Moreover, our college is the only college to have a special wing for international dean for student exchange. All the departments are encouraged to have a memorandum of understanding with the industries as well as with other institutions. The American College pays great attention and attractions towards academic bank of credits. So, we are planning to move towards Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) for the welfare of the student's community.

17.Skill development:

India is in need of an education system, which is affordable, flexible and relevant to the individuals as well as the society. Skilled workforce, managers and entrepreneurs are in great demand. Moreover, the skill-oriented courses available in the market have low credibility and acceptability in the industry. Recognising this scenario, the UGC has introduced the concept of community colleges, B.Voc. Degree Programmes and Kaushal Kendras to offer skill-oriented courses, which can be accessed by underprivileged students. Moreover, there are opportunity for students to develop a wide range of soft skills, such as communication, working in various settings, emotional sensitivity, critical and creative thinking, decision-making abilities, and the ability to work and negotiate with others as well as manage stress and conflict in ourselves and others through soft skill programmes. While, hard skills teach us what to do, soft skills tell us how to apply our hard skills in a social environment. College has tie up with various professional, industrial and educational organizations to ensure the skill development among students at large. Academic progress can be positively impacted by skill development. Students improve their critical thinking, problem-solving, and cognitive skills when they participate in skill-building activities. These abilities are beneficial in both academic and real-world contexts.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The practice of formally introducing and merging the Indian Knowledge Systems as a part of regular curriculum in Educational Institutes can greatly help the globalised Indian students to understand and appreciate their deep-rooted cultures and values and implant pride in their minds. Hence the college integrated Indian Knowledge System in its curriculum and has opened up its gateways to interested students to formally learn Indian Knowledge System related courses. The college offers exclusive courses in Tamil and Hindi Literatures that celebrate the cultural heritage of the country, and every student of the undergraduate programmes are taught Tamil and Hindi up to the first four semesters. In specific, the Departments of English, Tamil, Hindi, Economics, Religion, Philosophy and Sociology offer Indian Knowledge System embedded courses as part of their regular curriculum. The Study Centre for Indian Literature in English is an abode for ten thousand volumes of Literature, translated into English from Indian Languages for the use of the students.

The American College's focus on Outcome Based Education underscores its unwavering commitment to delivering quality education. By aligning educational practices with clearly defined learning outcomes, the institution equips graduates with the knowledge, skills, and values needed to thrive in a global landscape.

20.Distance education/online education:

The department of English is offering online classes for students of Constantine, the Philosopher University, Slovakia each semester. Also the college is offering Value Added Courses through online. These Value-Added Courses prepare students to meet industry demands and bridge the skill-gaps between the academia and industry. The college took a policy decision that every department should offer at least three to five Value Added courses per semester to its students. Both Continuous Internal Assessment and End-of-Semester Examinations are conducted only online.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The College is situated on a sprawling 48 acres of lush green Main campus and a Satellite campus spanning 54 acres, in a rural setting near Chattrapatti. The state-of-the-art infrastructure augments learning and promotes a good teaching-learning environment.

The College has more than 150 classrooms, 30 Department-level seminar Halls, one computer centre with 1694 computers exclusively for student usage. The College has a centralized sophisticated instrumentation centre ACCIC and auditorium with a 400-seating capacity each for organizing various conferences/seminars and cultural events. The classrooms are enabled withWi-Fi and Smart TV facilities. The seminar Halls are equipped with the necessary ICT facilities. The College also has PsalmsAudio-visual recording centre and Rehoboth Recording Theatre that can be used for developing MOOC content and other purposes.

During the assessment period of April 2022 - March 2023; New Laboratories and Research rooms are built in Stoffer Hall for the Chemistry, Microbiology and Zoology departments to enhance the teaching-learning activities. More than 25instruments were purchased for the science laboratories.

The Daniel Poor Memorial Library is fully computerised with KOHA software with RFID technology for circulation. The "Digitization of Library" Project is successfully completed to preserve 2033

rare book collections in collaboration with Anna Centenary Library Chennai.

6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ Perspective plan has been clearly articulated and implemented

The American college exemplifies a dedication to ongoing improvement and the enrichment of the educational experience through global collaboration and interdisciplinary approaches. One notable achievement in this endeavor is the successful implementation of an MOU with Constantine the Philosopher University in Nitra, Slovakia.

In response to an invitation by Dr. Robert Stroud of Grapevine University, Japan, Hosei University, The American College's Department of English proposed a Language & Literature course, spearheaded by Dr. J. Paul Jayakar and faculty members. Rigorous approvals from academic bodies such as the Departmental Meeting, Board of Studies, Senatus, Faculty, and Academic Council were secured, aligning the course with the college's strategic plan.

The collaboration extended globally when Dr. Maria from Constantine the Philosopher University in Nert joined forces with the committee. Through extensive exchanges via emails and online meetings, the committee successfully delivered the "Modern Indian Poetry in English" course in Spring 2023, garnering positive student feedback.

Buoyed by this success, the committee is presently developing "Indian Literature and Culture" for Spring 2024. Constantine the Philosopher University acknowledged this collaborative effort by presenting certificates to the instructors. The partnership was solidified with a memorandum of understanding between the institutions, emphasizing academic excellence and global engagement.

Every academic year, newly recruited faculty are given an orientation program to effectively empower themselves in the college culture for the betterment of the student community. To enhance quality among the non-teaching faculty, a one-day workshop on "Basic computing skills" was conducted. 129 staff members benefited and were trained in the productive skills of using various software.

Practice 2:

IQAC institutionalised quality assurance by conducting the Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) annually. AAA is conducted at the departmental level. The evaluation process is carried out by an external audit team which consists of faculty experts from other institutions. At the end of the audit, the panel provides suggestions to the top management. Based on their suggestions, a detailed plan of action is prepared to implement the teaching and learning reforms.

Practice 1: Student Exchange Programs

As a part of student mobility program, The School of Bioscience of Mahsa University, Malaysia, the MoU partner institute of The American College, conducted a summer internship titled "Recent trends in Biomedical techniques".16 students and two faculty members participated in the internship during the month of April 2023 and gained adaptation, problem solving, and expertise in cross-cultural communication.

Practice 2: Science expo-2023

The scientific interest of college students is enhanced, and thinking skills are fostered by conducting a "Science expo-2023" to popularise science among school students. This helps college students to create new action projects, build new tools, system models, and rarefied objects based on ideas imbibed in the classroom. Students showcase a range of models and explain the workings of their models to school students, which help them to develop effective presentations, communication skills and gain self-confidence. Around 3500 school students from various schools across the city participated in the exhibition.

7.1.3 - Describe the facilities in the institution for the management of the following types of degradable and non-degradable waste (within a maximum of 200 words)

Wastes refer to materials or substances that are discarded, abandoned, or otherwise considered useless or unwanted. The College generates a diverse array of waste stemming from their multifaceted activities. The college installed red dustbin to collect nondegradable and green dustbin for degradable waste in the college premises.

Leaf litters are considered to be the major source of solid waste. With the support of Solid Waste Management unit of Service-Learning Programme, solid wastes are converted into fertilizer at the vermicompost unit of the college. Liquid waste from RO plants is reused for gardening. The toilet waste is disposed through underground public sewage system after treated at septic tanks.

In Chemistry Lab, fume hoods are installed to abate the Hazardous Fumes and Vapor. All the laboratories are following Safety Standards and Regulations. Biowaste is discarded under proper disposal methods, including biohazard containers and adherence to safety protocols to mitigate potential risks. To ensure safe environment, the waste has been disposed by autoclave and microwave treatment. Incinerators are used in biochemistry lab. E-Waste Drives are carried through Green Club and Leo Club of our college. Discarded electronic and electrical appliances are collected from labs, departments and administrative offices and delivered to the NGOs.

"Serving People is Serving God". The American College continuously concerns on the community since 1881. The college serves in rearing the adolescent sons of soil with essential skills to act globally. The Satellite Campus at Chatrapatti was instituted in 2015 with 221 students. And in the year 2022-23, there are 1423 students on roll.

Inclusiveness:

Local population around the Satellite Campus is rural and their major source of income is agriculture and farming. Majority of the native community is underprivileged and the women are curbed in every aspect. The Satellite Campus promotes higher education opportunities to them. 353 (24.8 %) students are coming from coming from 8 km radius and 217 (15.25 %) students are women students. Out of the women students, 33 (15.21%) are from neighborhood villages.

Challenges:

Majority of the local youth coming for higher education finds hard to cope up as they all hail from village schools where they got their schooling in Tamil medium. This is the main barrier to them to come for higher education. Also, they are unaware of career opportunities.

Action:

The college meets the local society periodically through SLP and NSS activities to make them aware of higher education and opportunities.
