The students are given interdisciplinary exposure through supportive courses, life skill courses and non-major elective courses. The students were encouraged to opt for massive open online courses, offered in SWAYAM platform.

The college offers diverse opportunities for students to participate, experience and learn from a wide range of Co-Curricular, Extra-Curricular, Social, Sports and Community initiatives. Besides participation, these initiatives provide students the opportunity to develop Leadership, Organizing, Communication and Management Skills which are crucial to differentiate them in the society. College has tie up with various professional, industrial and educational organizations to ensure the skill development among students at large. Students improve their critical thinking, problem-solving, and cognitive skills when they participate in skill-building activities. These abilities are beneficial in both academic and real-world contexts.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The college integrated Indian Knowledge System in its curriculum and has opened up its gateways to interested students to formally learn Indian Knowledge System related courses. The college offers exclusive courses in Tamil and Hindi Literatures that celebrate the cultural heritage of the country, and every student of the undergraduate programmes are taught Tamil and Hindi up to the first four semesters. In specific, the Departments of English,

Tamil, Hindi, Economics, Religion, Philosophy and Sociology offer Indian Knowledge System embedded courses as part of their regular curriculum. The Study Centre for Indian Literature in English is an abode for ten thousand volumes of Literature, translated into English from Indian Languages for the use of the students.

The department of English is offering online classes for students of Constantine, the Philosopher University, Slovakia each semester. Also the college is offering Value Added Courses through online. These Value-Added Courses prepare students to meet industry demands and bridge the skill-gaps between the academia and industry. The college took a policy decision that every department should offer at least three to five Value Added courses per semester to its students. Both Continuous Internal Assessment and End-of-Semester Examinations are conducted only online.

The American College is situated on a sprawling 48 acres of lush green Main campus and a Satellite campus spanning 54 acres, in a rural setting near Chattrapatti, featuring well-equipped infrastructural and physical facilities to enhance the teachinglearning process. The institution's learning resources are accommodated within a heritage building covering 180 classrooms, 30 Department-level seminar Halls, one computer centre with 1889 computers exclusively for student usage. The College has a centralized sophisticated instrumentation centre ACCIC and auditorium with a 400-seating capacity each for organizing various conferences/seminars and cultural events. The classrooms are enabled with Wi-Fi and Smart TV facilities. The seminar Halls are equipped with the necessary ICT facilities. The College also has Psalms Audio-visual recording centre and Rehoboth Recording Theatre that can be used for developing MOOC content and other purposes. The Daniel Poor Memorial Library is fully computerised with KOHA software with RFID technology for circulation along with 167079 books and 87 subscriptions based printed journals in the central library. The "Digitization of Library" Project is successfully completed to preserve 2033 rare book collections in collaboration with Anna Centenary Library Chennai. The college upholds a commitment to inclusivity by providing ramps and a dedicated room with computing facilities for specially challenged students.

ranging from 600 Mbps in main campus and 500 mbps, supported by 83 strategically placed WiFi access points. This ensures uninterrupted access for academic and research activities. A robust data center serves as the Campus Information System (CIS), managing student databases and maintaining attendance records. Different user categories are assigned customized firewall policies, with unrestricted internet access for administrators and faculty, while students are restricted to educational content. Campus safety is further enhanced by 182 CCTV cameras on the main campus and 36 on the satellite campus, ensuring a secure environment for students and visitors. The college supports an extensive computer network, dedicating 1,889 computers exclusively for student use. The DPM Library complements this infrastructure by providing free internet access to students and faculty for accessing e-resources. It also houses a unique Talking Book Library designed for visually challenged students (VCS).

Feedbacks are obtained from stakeholders such as parents, Alumni, employers, industries, and students. To cater to academic and research activities, the institute has well-established laboratories. Regular maintenance of equipment is required for proper functioning of the equipment. Equipments are purchased through the e-procurement method following the norms and procedures. The college library is equipped with all

learning materials including books, journals, e-journals, code books, magazines, articles, etc. that facilitate students to use the library effectively. Lawns, Water Supply & Rain Water Harvesting Projects are installed on all the buildings including (Administrative Block, Science Block, and IT Block).

A stadium is available for practicing extracurricular activities. Regular practices of sports and annual sports meets are conducted in this facility.

Caretakers are appointed to take care of the maintenance of physical, academic, and support facilities within the campus. The librarian takes care of the computer and maintains records of books. Repair and maintenance of the physical assets are undertaken at the end of each academic session.

For purchase of new equipment and infrastructure maintenance total budget of Rs. 64,66,41,897 has been spent during this academic year.

The College generates a diverse array of waste stemming from their multifaceted activities. The college installed red dustbin to collect nondegradable and green dustbin for degradable waste in the college premises. Leaf litters are considered to be the major source of solid waste. With the support of Solid Waste Management unit of Service-Learning Programme, solid wastes are converted into fertilizer at the vermicompost unit of the college. Liquid waste from RO plants is reused for gardening. The toilet waste is disposed through underground public sewage system after treated at septic tanks. In Chemistry Lab, fume hoods are installed to abate the Hazardous Fumes and Vapor. All the laboratories are following Safety Standards and Regulations. Biowaste is discarded under proper disposal methods, including biohazard containers and adherence to safety protocols to mitigate potential risks. To ensure safe environment, the waste has been disposed by autoclave and microwave treatment. Incinerators are used in biochemistry lab.

"Serving People is Serving God". The College continuously concerns on the community since 1881. The college serves in rearing the adolescent sons of soil with essential skills to act globally. The Satellite Campus at Chatrapatti was instituted in 2015 with 221 students. And in the year 2023-24, there are 1520 students on roll.

Inclusiveness:

Local population around the Satellite Campus is rural and their major source of income is agriculture, farming. Majority of the native community is underprivileged and the women are curbed in every aspect. The Satellite Campus promotes higher education opportunities to them. 382 (25.13 %) students are coming from coming from 13 km radius. 349 (22.96 %) students are women students. Out of the women students 38 (10.8%) are from neighborhood villages.

Challenges:

Most of the local students coming for higher education finds difficulty in attaining their academic dreams as they all hail from village schools taught in Tamil medium. Lack of communication and cognizant skills, they lack opportunity to study in urban institutions. Even career opportunities are also not revealed to them.
